He wanted everyone aware for the professional services, Bob will have the go ahead to get the drawings and then the capital will be appropriated about the June-July period when they come to the Board for approval.

Staffing

Tim Halstead distributed figures on calls and. Rob mentioned Deb had taken job description and put it through the point system to see where it would fall if we did it through the county. Depending on what range, with fringe benefits it would probably start at \$57,000. Doc has someone he knows that was interested in the range of \$30,000. The wage has to be based on the job description. There are a myriad of areas that have to be factored in to come to the final wage. We could contract it if it was a service to a business. This doesn't pass the independent contractor rules through IRS. We could pay for the outcome and pay contractual that way. Doc - some shelters are run by volunteers or humane societies. The \$30,000 doesn't include liability insurance or other insurances.

lot of dogs out there that aren't licensed. If they had the staff, they could make sure that this is happening and revenue coming in. They charged \$50.00 a ticket for no dog license. He doesn't feel they are vaccinated also. The Treasurer is thinking of doing a license day throughout the County. Bill said it was more efficient when the vets were able to handle the licenses at the time the dogs were vaccinated. Doc doesn't think he should be a tax collector. His main concern is that animals are kept well. It wasn't clear to his customers that he was not profiting from collecting the fees. Doc explained how they handled a "rabies day" campaign that worked well. He thinks they should receive more than .25 cents to handle the licenses; more like \$2.00-\$3.00 is more appropriate. Forms can be picked up at the vet's office and online.

Rob - stressed there needs to be justification of the position. Kennel inspections are \$10 for 10 dogs, \$25 for more. 1986 to 2001 there were 3 full-time and 3 part-time employees. 2002-2003 the office position was eliminated; 2004 the animal control officer was eliminated and there was no part-timer. 2005 there were some part-time people helping him from that point on. Are we demonstrating revenue or level of service? Since we've lost enforcing capabilities we've lost the licensing. Doc thinks we have about 18,000 dog owners and that figure came from the state. The state doesn't require a kennel license; it's for breeding and hunting of dogs. The law says all dogs must have licenses and rabies shots. According to dog logs, they don't have to have a rabies license to get a kennel license. Dean - wondering what we are trying to prove for staffing. Thinks we need to address the service that we are not able to provide. Rob - problem we're going to have - animal control and animal shelter are two different functions. Shelter is non-mandatory as opposed to control which is, to a certain degree. The issue of euthanasia has to be defined. We assume that the goal is not to do that. From a cost perspective, try to demonstrate what is mandated from non-mandated. Demonstrate what the net effect is of what is being done now. What is the actual problem that we are trying to solve. How do these demographics compare to other situations we have in other departments of the County; health department, senior services, etc. How does this need fall with the long list of needs that have been identified. We have volunteers but we need to have a facility that we can work with. Tim - there is physically no room to conduct business. Rob - there has to be an ROI on what we are trying to solve. Why is this more of a problem for Allegan County than some other problem; this is what we have to have a tangible sense to. What is the net effect of things on Allegan County? Doesn't think revenue is going to come into the picture on this problem. Janet wondered if safety isn't a big issue because of the hazard un-vaccinated dogs creates to the public. Steve - if the revenue is maximized to work with the program, it should make a difference. Rob - if we put a cost to what we are doing out there. Janet - we could raise the adoption fees if we are offering a healthier animal. Doc - the fines should also be more in-line with what it actually costs. Animal population has exploded; especially horse owners. Horse owners haven't got a clue how to properly care for them. As animal husbandry dies, we need these animal control services more.

Tim - Dispatch can track calls, but not the work and how those complaints are being handled. People have stopped calling because they know they aren't going to get the service. Rob asked how many calls are answered for how many calls coming in? We need to try to find this correlation. We have to find a way to show how the complaints aren't being met now. Looking at figures collected - total number of dogs vs. total

number of dogs adopted. 1996 the numbers were showing only 23% were claimed or adopted; what fees were collected. Increasing staff vs. adoptions - if we increased fees, we still couldn't account for this.

Rob stated the bottom line - we have to have actual research that can demonstrate all this. Look at the impact of technology and rules and regulation changes and the net effect of all that. Complaints are going to be critical; Tim needs to show how we are not able to respond to those, and focus on how we start building this. We need to develop how we are going to analyze or develop an argument; where are we headed. Let's figure out where we want to go and then how do we get there. He suggested possibly sending this to the County Services Committee to see what those questions are; what are questions on commissioners' minds and then bring those back to this committee to figure out how to work with that.

Dean - it's how we report the information; how complaints are being handled, what those complaints are. The numbers don't really describe the problem. We have to get a figure on "humanity"; do we know that Allegan County wants us to take care of these needs. Tim thought the humane society might have information. Rob - what about other counties; they may have useful information - how they are doing things. They should be able to give us an idea of how the net income was developed.

Jim - he and Tim would get the real issues together. What's been created by what we haven't been able to handle. Put issues out there so we can talk about them individually and if they have the resources to handle them. If not, why. Rob - that would be helpful. What are actual issues; try and prioritize them. Gather what are the issues that would be nice to solve vs. what is critical and then form a recommendation. For next meeting might be helpful to meet in Zimmerman room. Come with lists of concerns and split those up between animal control and animal shelter. 27th 7:30. Have bob set doors to be open. Bill will check room availability.

2004 was the last year we had more than 1 full-time animal control officer.

The number of dog licenses has dropped in 2007 to the lowest number of licensed dogs. This could be a \$15,000 loss in revenue.

Licenses:

- 1 yr. license if dog is spayed or neutered - \$5.00
- 3 yr. license if dog is spayed or neutered - \$12.00
- 1 yr. license if dog is NOT spayed or neutered - \$10.00
- 3 yr. license if dog is NOT spayed or neutered - \$25.00

Allegan County Dog Census Statistics by Year

Total money brought in from sales of overdue dog licenses: \$11,237.50

- For a no dog license ticket, the fine is \$50.00.
- From 2005-2007, on average we transferred 225 dogs and 75 cats per year. If we would adopt out these animals, we would have revenue of \$9,000.00 per year.

Total number of dogs:

On this chart you can see that the number of dogs decreased as the Animal Control personal decreased.

Total number of dogs adopted:

On this chart you can see that the percentage of adopted dogs went up in 2000. The Animal Shelter started to work with rescues and started to use petfinder. The State of Michigan also required that adopted animals needed to be spay or neutered. You can also see that the percentage of adopted dogs goes up from the year 2000. This is do to the lower number of dogs at the Animal Shelter.

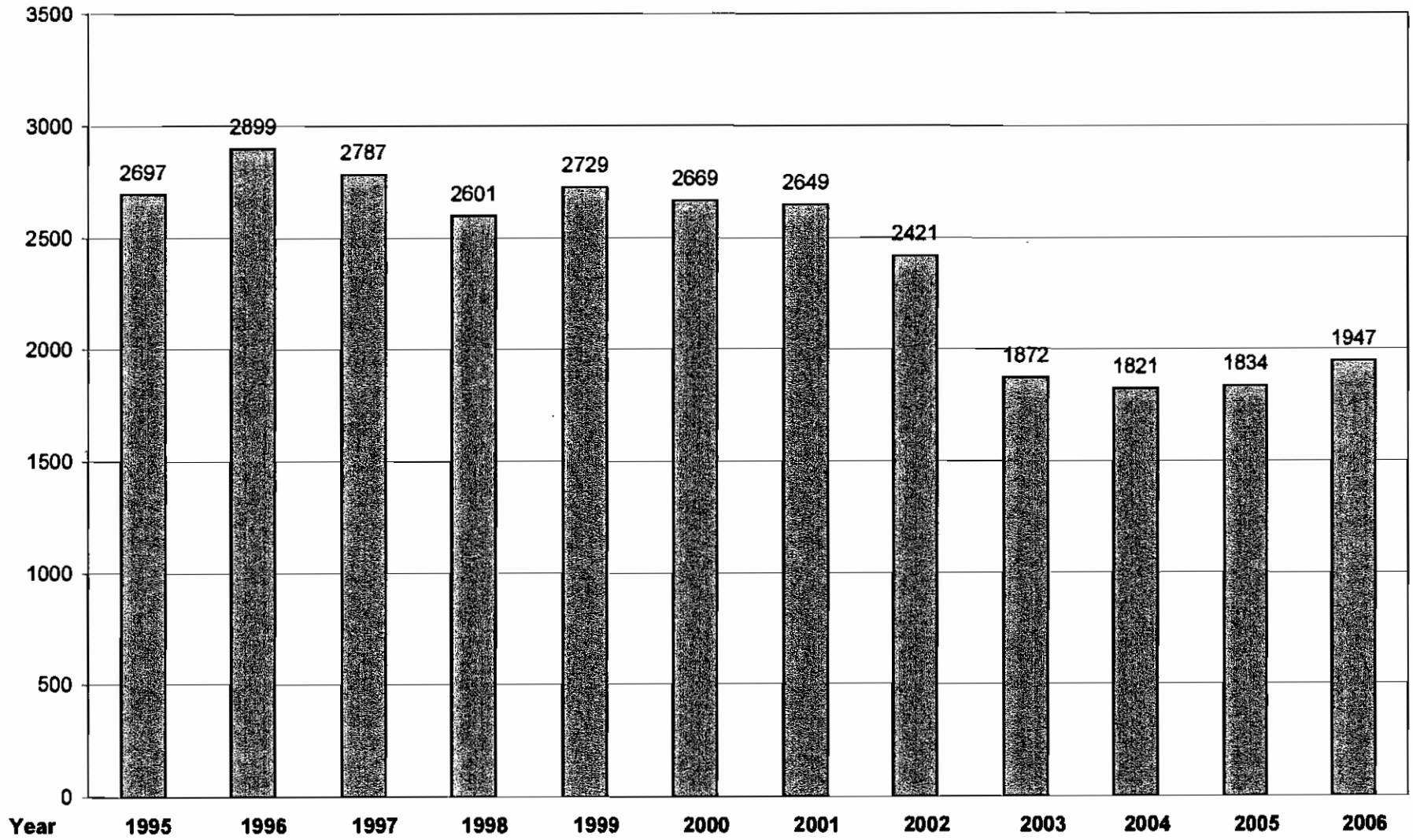
Total number of cats:

The reason for high numbers of cats are do to fact that there are no State or County Ordinances. Cats are not required to get shots or licence. They are allowed to run and breed over populating areas.

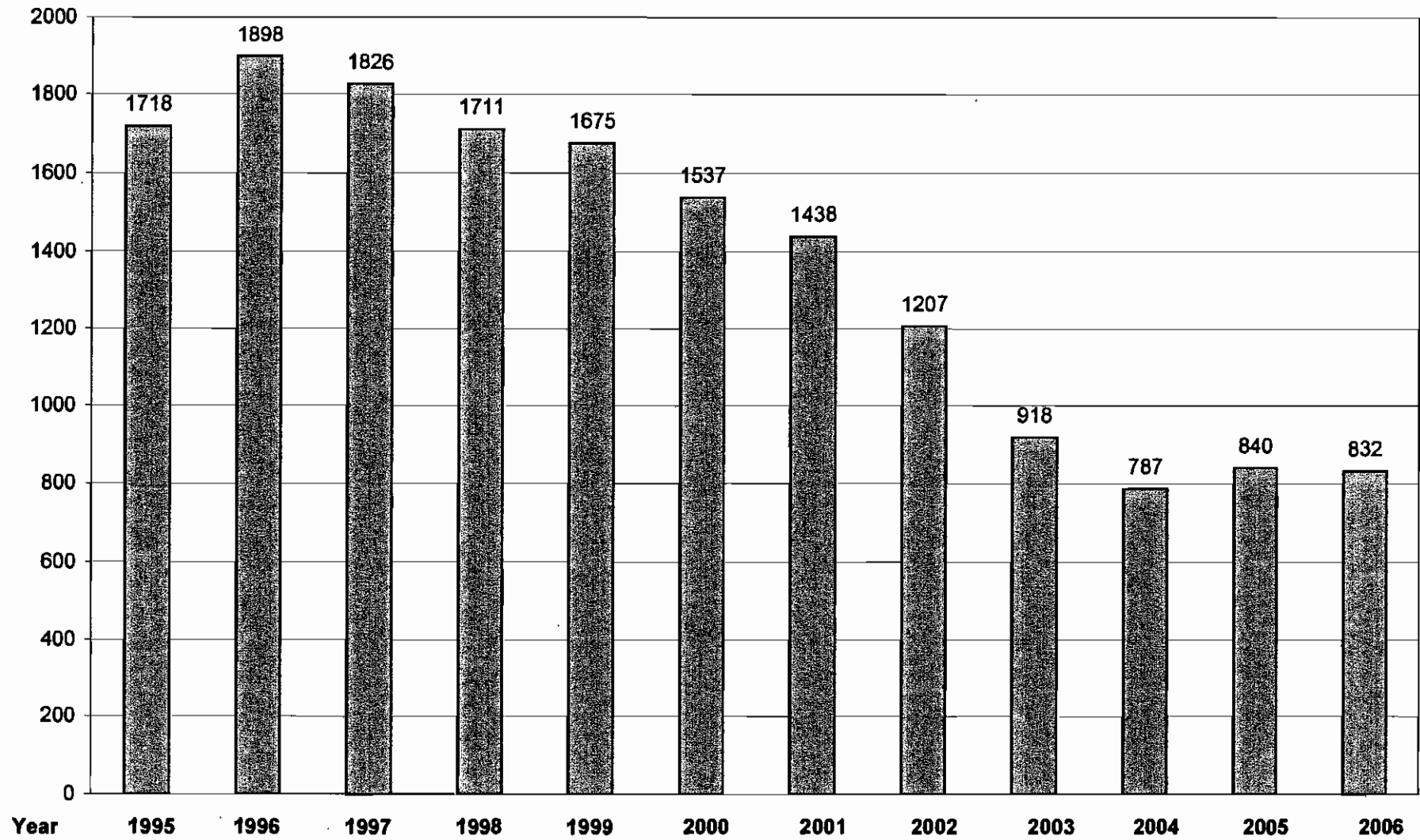
Total number of cats adopted:

The numbers of cats adopted is low because most of the cats that come in to the Animal Shelter are feral. The rescues that we use are usually for except for speciality cats.

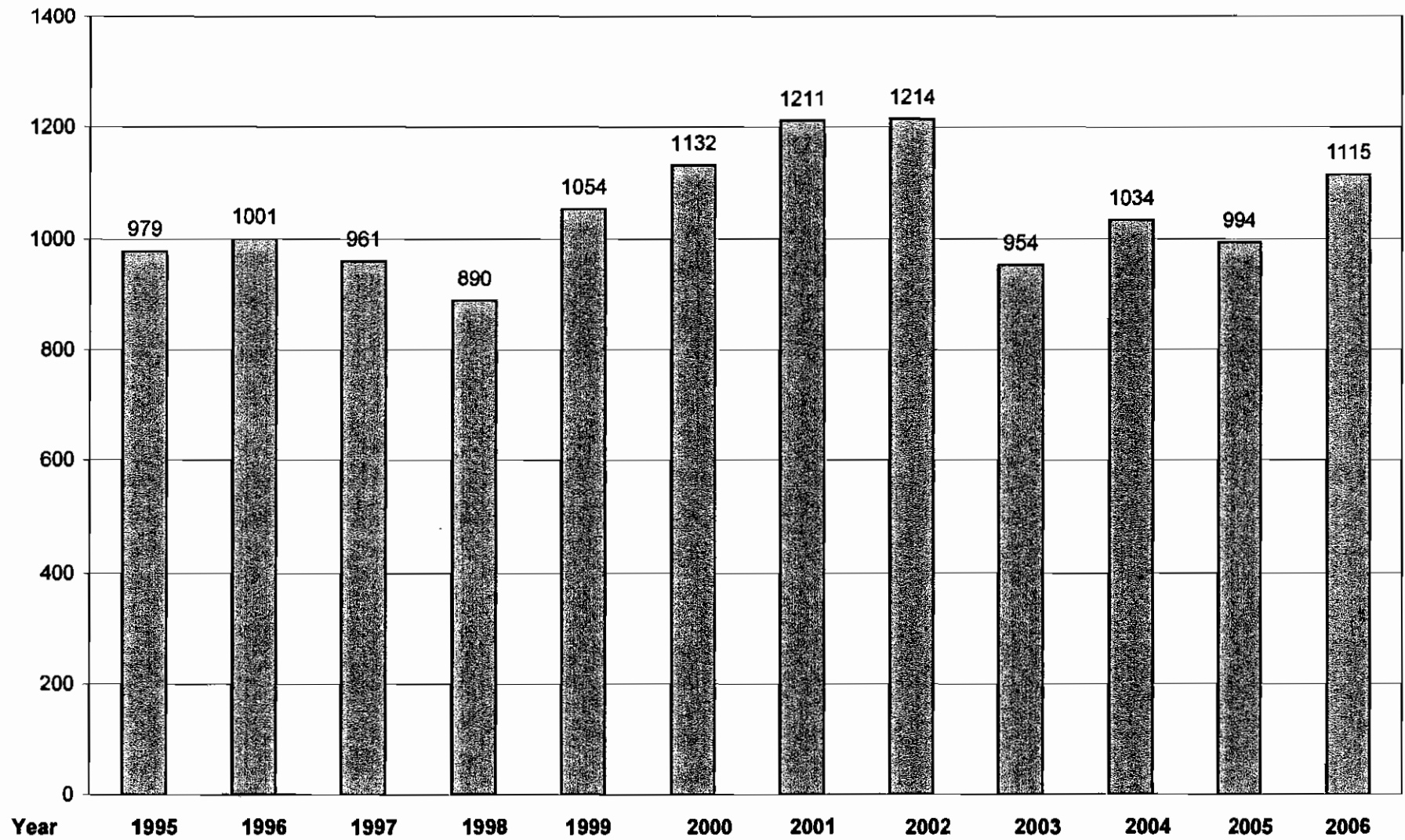
Total number of cats and dogs house at Animal Shelter



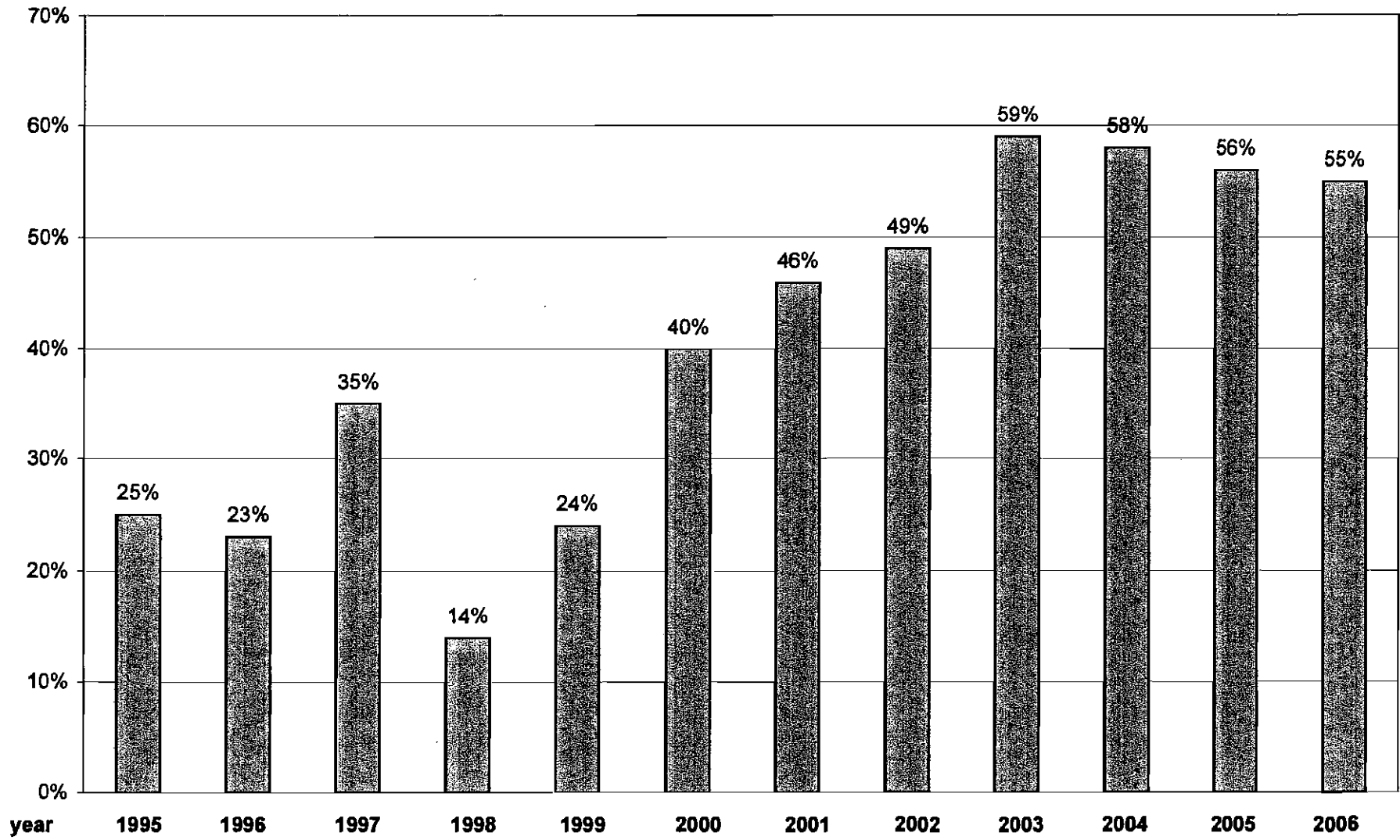
Total number of dogs



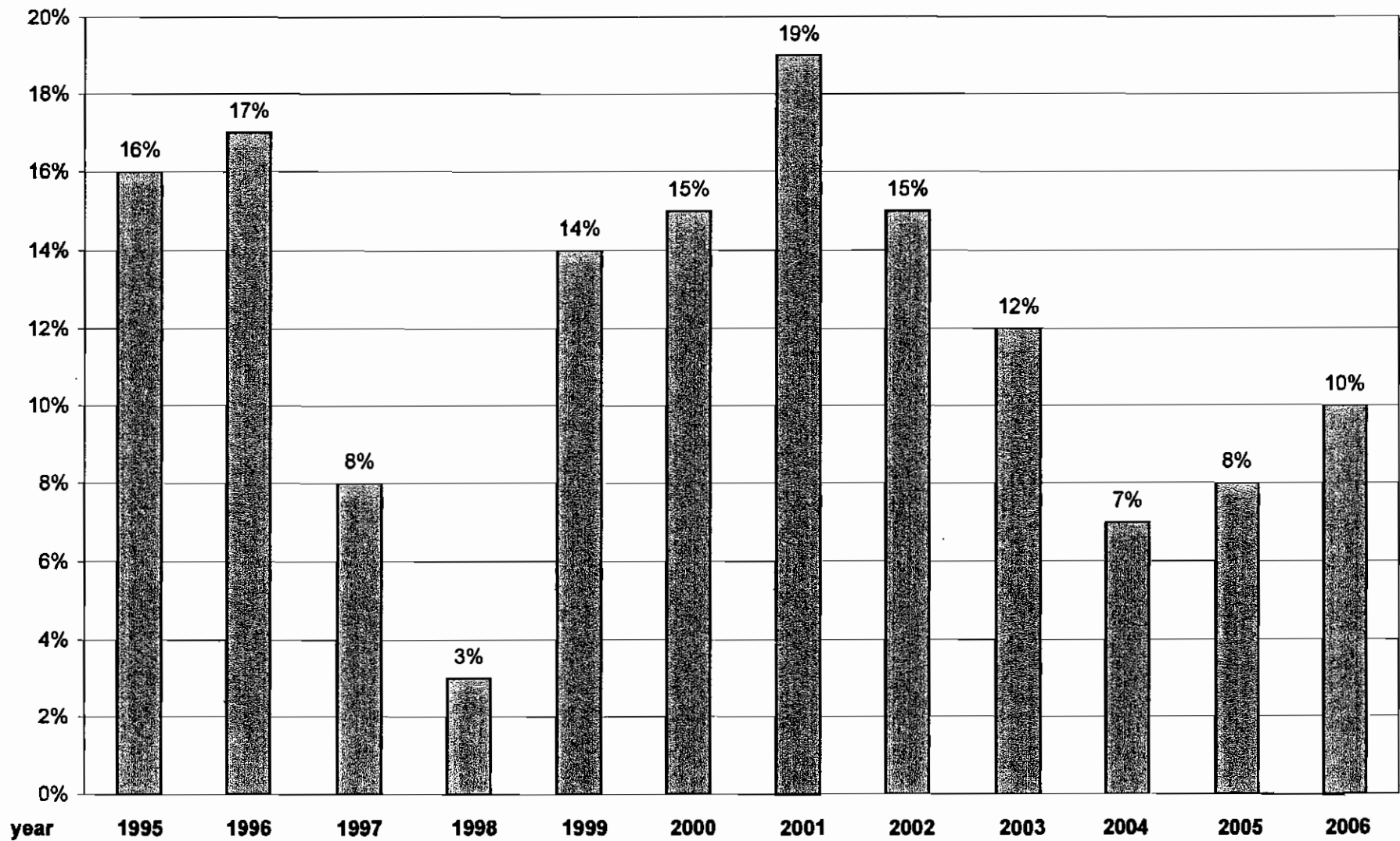
Total number of cats

Total number of complaints:

Before 1995 there are no records of complaints. The animal complaints that came in to the Animal Shelter and Central Dispatch were put on pieces of paper.

From 1995 to the year 2000, Central Dispatch was authorized to enter the after hour calls into their system. During this time Animal Control Officers were called out on the majority of these calls.

In 2001 the Animal Shelter became computerized. This allowed us to enter complaints into the same system Central Dispatch was using.

In 2002 you can see a high number of complaints. This is due to how we entered our complaints. Every complaint that came in was given a complaint number. We also used the two part time Animal Control Officers this year. At the end of 2002 we lost the full time office person and one part time officer.

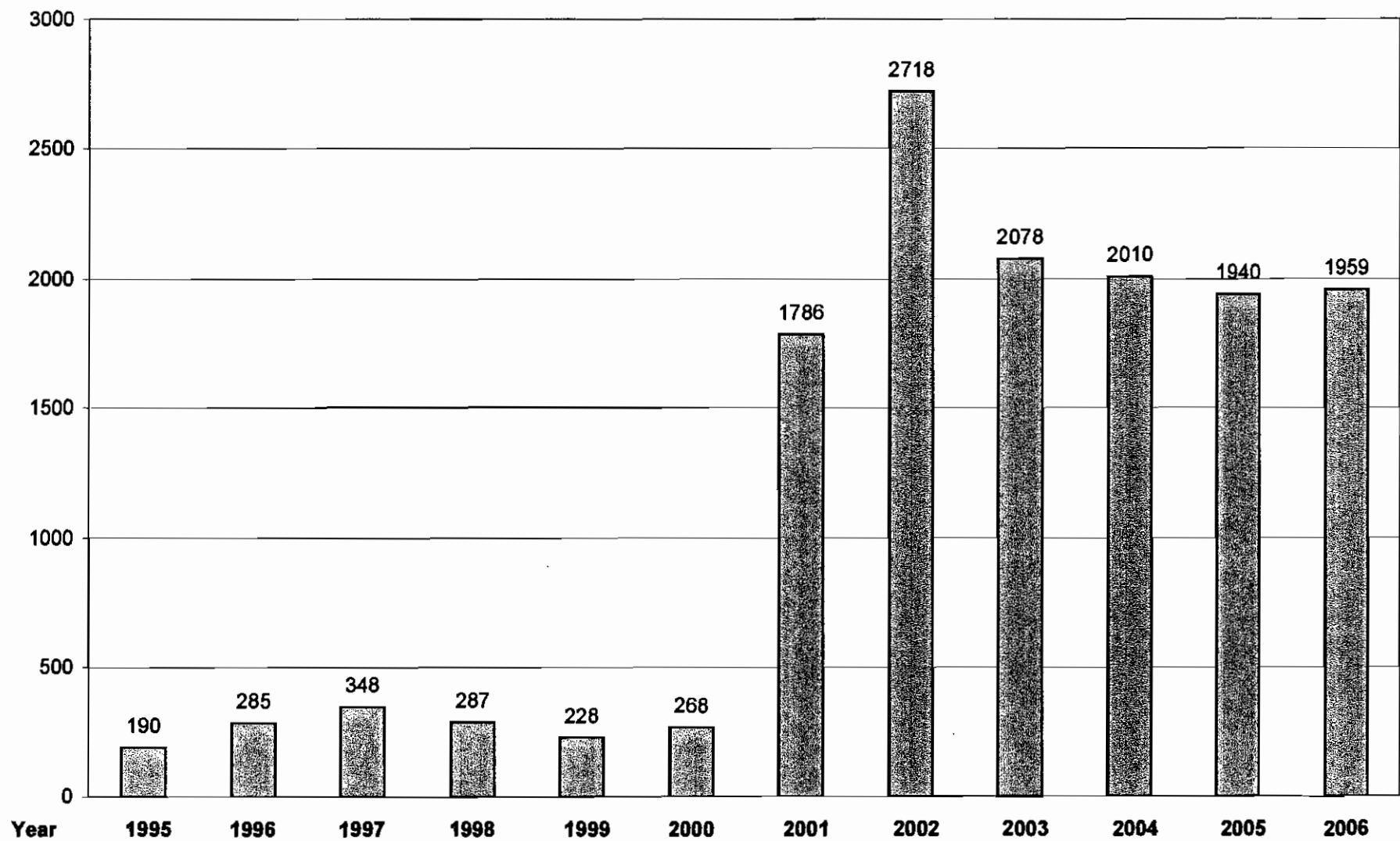
In 2003 we changed the way we entered complaints. When we would set a trap, we would use the same number every time we emptied the trap. This in turn lowered the total number of complaints. We also lost the other part time officer.

In 2004 we lost a full time Animal Control Officer. The Animal Control Officers time was now split between the Animal Shelter and Animal Control.

In 2005 and 2006 we had part time personal that would help out.

The total number of complaints reflect the number of complaints called in. These numbers are not the number of complaints that are completed. The complaints that are being completed are animal pick ups and animal bites.
